

## Northwest University College of Ministry Kirkland, Washington JANUARY 20-23, 2015 PMIN 5253: SPIRITUAL FORMATION AND DIRECTION (3 credit hours)

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# **Course Syllabus**

**COURSE DESCRIPTION:** This course is designed to enhance the minister's experience of lifelong spiritual transformation. In addition to the classic spiritual disciplines and virtues, an array of contributions from various streams of the Christian tradition will be considered, including the ways in which life experience can be spiritually forming if properly engaged. The model used in this course is designed to encourage leaders to facilitate the spiritual growth of those they lead by example, to become leaders worth following.

## **COURSE OBJECTIVES:**

The course is an arena for personal growth of several kinds:

- *Character development:* **humbling** ourselves as the Spirit uses a new appreciation of the spiritual disciplines to grow a greater dependence on God.
- *Historical exegesis:* **interpreting** major forms of Christian spiritual formation in their context and current application.
- *Theological reflection:* **hearing** ministry as posing critical theological questions that must be engaged through a biblically faithful theology of formation.
- *Personal reframing*: **seeing** personal and corporate ministry as an evolving, holistic relationship with God rather than a set of static roles and functions.
- *Community formation:* **relating** to other believers in a community that simulates seeking after God as the primary task of the Christian minister.
- *Ministry enhancement:* **discerning** the leading of the Spirit in the fulfillment of Christ's mission through our own calling.
- Ongoing growth: equipping with practices and insights that can inform an ongoing process of spiritual growth in all of the objectives above.

**COURSE METHODOLOGY:** The course combines lecture, discussion, multi-media, small group exercises, reading, and writing assignments to facilitate the discovery of the subject matter and its integration into ministry.

## **COURSE REQUIREMENTS:**

#### 1. Pre-session:

a. *Read:* 750 pages from the Course Reading Options list prior to the first class session. No books read previously should be counted toward the course reading requirement.

[The percentage of pre-session reading completed should be indicated on the Reading Reflection paper turned in on the last day of class].

 b. Write: a Reading Critique paper of 4-5 pages summarizing the key ideas from the precourse reading that you found most important, disturbing, and/or enlightening. Summarize the key arguments briefly and then reflect on how they apply to your present or future ministry context. This paper is due on the last day of class, and is worth 100 points.

#### 2. During the session:

- a. Attendance: at all course sessions;
- b. *Participation:* in all classroom discussions, exercises, and assignments;

### 3. Post-Session:

a. *Reading:* Complete 750 pages of reading from the Course Reading Options list.

[The **Post-Session Reading Report** attached to this syllabus should be submitted on or before **February 28, 2015** with all post-session work].

- b. Write: a Reading Critique paper of 4-5 pages summarizing the key ideas from the precourse reading that you found most important, disturbing, and/or enlightening. Summarize the key arguments briefly and then reflect on how they apply to your present or future ministry context. This paper is due on the last day of class, and is worth 100 points.
  - c. *Living Free:* Watch each of the five core teachings on "Foundations of Freedom" from the following web address (http://gatewaypeople.com/ministries/freedom-kairos/media1). Upon completion of this assignment, write a five-page paper that identifies key areas of understanding related to living in God's freedom. This assignment counts for 200 points. **Due date: February 28, 2015.**
- d. Personal Retreat: Spend a "half-a-day" (four hours) alone without electronic communication with the outside world in a personal time of devotion with God. Bring only a Bible and a notepad and pen. Spend the time asyou feel led, then, drawing on course readings and sessions, write a 5-page paper reflecting on what God did for you and said to you during this retreat. This assignment counts for 200 points. Due date: February 28, 2015.
- e. Choose one of the following options (400 points): Due date: February 28, 2015.
  - 1) **Devise a self-development plan:** write a 10-page paper detailing your plan for developing yourself and others spiritually. This should include background research, personal growth, training, skill enhancements sought, implementation challenges, evaluation methods, and a timeline.
  - 2) Create a sermon series: using insights gained from the class, write 3-4 high-quality sermons of significant length on the subject of spiritual growth. Do not recycle old messages! You may do either a manuscript, or a very detailed outline. While all sermons must be turned in hard copy, they may be accompanied by audio and/or media support (e.g., PowerPoint, video clips).
  - 3) *Write a research paper:* choose a major theme related to the course and write a 10-page research paper. The paper should identify and reflect upon key ideas related to the topic, report on some of the major literature in the area, and apply conclusions to your ministry context. Supporting footnotes and a 15-item bibliography are required.
  - 4) Propose a self-designed project: every student has the option of proposing one or more Self-Designed projects that relate specifically to a ministry or research interest relevant to the course subject matter. The professor must then approve a specific project in advance.

All written assignments are to be typed, double-spaced, represent high-quality, original, graduate-level work, and follow the *Turabian* style manual, 7<sup>th</sup> edition.

All assignments can be emailed to the professor (john.spurling@tku.edu) with a title page that includes name, address, phone and email, course number, title, and site.

*Due date:* all post-session assignments must be emailed or postmarked no later than February 28, 2015. Grades for late work will be lowered by one letter grade for each week by which the project exceeds this deadline.
